# What defines a system?

- What types and levels of interaction define a system?
  - Can systems be purely economic?
  - What level of interaction qualifies as systemic?
- Political/military
  - High interaction capacity
- Economic
  - High to medium or even low interaction capacity
- Social
  - Lowest level of required interaction capacity

# Defining the system

- Four possible options
  - Anything goes
  - Eliminate cultural/social element
  - Eliminate economic element
  - Disaggregate into sectors.

Full International System


- ★ High IC
- All Sectors

Economic International System


- Lower IC
- No Political/Military Sector

Pre-International System

- ★ Low IC
- ⋆ Mostly Socio-Cultural

#### Units

- What are units?
  - Sufficiently cohesive so as to have actor qualities
  - Must let go of the assumption that units take on a particular form.

# Systems

- Mechanical
  - Most Realist and economic views of systems
  - Unity of Science
  - Interactions structurally determined
- Social
  - Perceptions major determinant of action
  - Remember: three kinds of system.
    - Nature of environment depends on the relative strength of all three

- Units establish common rules and institutions for the conduct of relations
- International system (Hobbes), international society (Grotius), world society (Kant)
  - Transition from international system to society requires mutual recognition and legal equality
  - Cold War comprised of two international societies?

#### Structuration

 Have to find a way to allow for both agency and the influence of structure...
